She has on, and took with her, an old white bonnet, an old calico blue and yellow sprig gown, and an old blue quilt petticoat. Whoever apprehends the above apprentice, and secures her in any of his Majesty's jails so that her master may have her again, shall receive the above reward, and no charges.
