

The purpose of the Rappahannock Colonial Heritage Society is to bring together persons interested in preserving and perpetuating the heritage and culture of the colonial era in and around the Rappahannock River Valley of Virginia; to conduct historical research of persons, places and events relating to the Rappahannock River Valley in Colonial times, and to organize activities related to the Colonial era in an effort to educate the public about the ways of life of our forbears in this area.

Sewing Circle Information

Ladies' Riding Habit: You may need to purchase the pattern in addition to the materials, so please call the Event Coordinator if you plan to make one. For the jacket and waistcoat (sizes 8-18), you'll need 3 ½ yards of 60-inch wide medium weight wool fabric and 3 ½ yards of 60-inch wide (or 5 yards of 45-inch wide) linen or linen/cotton in a matching or contrasting color for the lining. 1/2 yard of iron-on woven interfacing is optional. You'll also need 16 buttons (1-inch in diameter) for the jacket, 10 buttons (3/4-inch in diameter) for the waistcoat, matching thread and button hole twist. To make the matching petticoat, you'll need about 3 yards of 60inch wide medium weight wool fabric and 2 1/2 yards of 1- to 1 1/2-inch wide cotton, linen or wool tape in a coordinating color. Remember to wash, dry and press the linen fabric before you come. And if you have a sewing machine, bring it!

Note: The Sewing Circle scheduled for April 25 is tentative, depending on whether it is needed or not. Please let Sharon know in advance if you do.

April 27 - Stratford Hall Plantation's Coaching Day

Submitted by Elaine Sturgeon It's astounding how quickly three years have passed since we last attended Stratford Hall Plantation's Coaching Day; and April 27 (Sunday 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m.) is fast approaching.

As before, the focus of our scenario will be to demonstrate to the crowd what it would have been like to travel by coach in the 18th century. We will do this by:

(1) wearing attire appropriate for traveling: ladies in riding habits, brunswicks, cloaks, or just more sturdy, layered attire than for going about town

- or visiting; men would wear similarly the same, cloaks, hunting or riding clothes, boots, spatterdashes, leggings, or heavier layered clothing (see Sewing Circle info). All of this should be accompanied by the appropriate accoutrements such as hats and gloves for both gents and ladies. If you're imaginative and can come up with such accessories as riding crops and the like, all the better.
- (2) setting up an 18th century food display. When traveling in the 18th century they would have stopped at the coaching inns or taverns for food and lodging. We'll create that by setting up our marquee tent with our period appropriate food display (there will be a specific menu and table layout).
- (3) using bits and pieces: traveling trunks, coaching and riding accessories such as saddles, coaching horns, hunt horns, and horse brasses display.

Remember, we're being paid to do this event at an historical site so it's really important to be as period correct as we reasonably can be. Do your research and if you're not sure about some aspect of what you're putting together for your attire or otherwise, please ask some of the more experienced members of the group for advice.

You'll need to bring period correct eating utensils (plate, fork and knife, mug or glass) and folding chair (or something to sit on). Last time, it was very, very windy and cold so be prepared with some warm undergarments, etc.
